July

Tuesday 8th - Morning walk round Foxley Wood reserve looking for high-summer butterflies, notably Purple Emperor, White Admiral and Silver-washed Fritillary.

At 9.00am as we stood in the drizzle, I thought we might have a rather unproductive walk but we had a fantastic one. The sun soon came out and almost immediately we were given a glorious view of a White Admiral. Although we stood and waited at places where I'd previously seen Purple Emperors, we weren't lucky in seeing them. But while standing and scanning the Oaks trees we did see some Purple Hairstreaks. Besides them we were treated to large numbers of Ringlets, Large Whites and Silver-washed Fritillaries including two females of the *Valezina* form, one of which was being chased by three males. Hugh Barton captured a number of great photos. We also saw Large, Small and Essex Skippers and Hugh's photo's clearly show the black club end of the antennae of the Essex Skipper. This is the best and easiest way to distinguish them from Small Skippers. Besides them we spotted a few Brown Argus, a member of the "blue butterfly" family, and Commas that allowed people to spot the white comma shaped mark on the underwing – hence the name of the butterfly. A thoroughly enjoyable walk.
